

Skating Woods Family Eyes Ice Festival

Many local families are still enjoying ice skating every weekend at the Detroit Skating Club. Among them are Dr. Andrew Kenneth Wood and his sons, Bob, 13, Dick, 10, and Tim, 8. The Woods are residents of Long Pine Village.

Until this year, a son, Kenny, skated with them regularly. However, he is now enrolled at the Military Academy. The Woods have been skating at the Detroit Skating Club for the past seven years.

The club will present its annual Ice Festival next week, April 20, 27, and 28. In former years, the event has taken place at Olympia but this year it will be held at the club on W. Seven Mile road in Detroit.

The Friday and Saturday performances are at 8:30 p.m. and on Sunday there will be a matinee at 2 p.m. and an evening show at 7 p.m. Guests at the festival this year will be Jeffrey and Lynn Johnston, the Canadian dance team; the 1957 Olympic champions, Dr. and Mrs. Wood will skate in a showboat number this year and Bob will be a drummer in a native dance band.

Tom is the youngest skater in the club. Tim's teacher, Mr. Ronnie Hakow, will take him to Fort Wayne this summer for further instruction in figure skating. Tim has already passed the preliminary and first tests in figure skating. There are eight tests in all that must be passed before qualifying as a gold medalist.

The Wood boys have won many trophies for their skating in past years. This year, Dick's team, the Bantams, were the city hockey champions capturing the 1956-57 Detroit Department of Parks and Recreation, Bob's team, the Fee Wees, scumpered off with the same trophy as runners-up.

The club has four hockey teams. They are the Bantams for boys 10-12, the Fee Wees for boys 13-15, the Sub-juniors for boys 15-17 and the Junies for boys 17-20.

This past winter children from the Detroit Skating Club competed in Buffalo, N. Y., with some 12 other skating clubs from Canada and eastern U. S. They brought home the president's cup which they won for attaining the most points for free and figure skating.

- Add new Section VIII - Off-Street Parking Facilities in all zoning districts.
 - (a) In all zoning districts, off-street parking facilities shall be provided for parking of self-propelled passenger vehicles for the use of occupants, employees and patrons of buildings, and the minimum number of parking spaces shall be as follows:
 - (1) For the purpose of this amendment, a "parking space" shall mean an area of not less than 240 sq. ft. exclusive of aisles, ramps, drive ways, or other areas, and shall be suitable for the storage or parking of one self-propelled passenger vehicle.
 - (2) Existing off-street parking facilities provided at the effective date of this amendment, and which are being used at that date for the parking of automobiles, and which are in compliance with the provisions of this amendment, shall not be reduced to an amount less than hereinafter required under this ordinance for a similar new building or new use.
 - (3) For the purpose of this amendment, "floor area" shall mean the gross floor area accessible to the public, as determined by excluding areas occupied by fixtures, plants, patios, or terraces, including areas occupied by display and equipment used for display and sale of merchandise. It shall not mean floors or parts of floors used principally for storage of goods, incidental repair, processing or packaging of merchandise, or for other uses.
 - (4) In places of assembly in which patrons are spectators, seating facilities, each 20 square feet of such seating facilities shall be counted as one seat for the purpose of determining the minimum number of parking spaces required under this amendment.
 - (5) The following table will govern the number of off-street parking facilities required:

Use	Minimum Number of Parking Spaces per 1,000 sq. ft. of Floor Area
Hotels, Sanitaria, Convalescent Homes, Asylums, Hospitals for the Aged	One parking space for each four beds, but not less than one parking space for each 100 sq. ft. of floor area.
Theaters, Studios, Sports Arenas, Auditoriums, Churches, Assembly Halls	One parking space for each four seats.
