Franklin Plans Traffic Controls Near Cider Mill

FRANKLIN—Village Marshall Richard Ford, advised the council Monday night that signs reading "No Parking" and "No Through Traffic" will be placed in strategic spots throughout Franklin village when the Franklin cider mill opens this fall.

Ford indicated the measure was necessary to control the increase of traffic which occurs every fall when the thousands to visit the historic and picturesque mill just north of Fourteen Mile on Franklin road.

"NO PARKING" signs have already been posted by the county along Franklin and Fourteen, but additional signs will be placed weekends on local roads affected by the crowds.

The problem has been increasing steadily each fall and hazardous conditions have developed cutting off fire protection as well as danger to residents living along roads leading to the scenic attraction just outside the village.
