AMONG THE NEW ideas for fall are dressy hats made of mixture felts. These are colored by the blending of vari-colored furs as opposed to the usual solid dye-colored hats.

The popular flat crown models and the more recent tight-telescope shapes have been supplemented with even newer interpretations. Among these are the brand new "tele-pinch" models which are factory-shaped in the manner of the tight-telescope with the addition of a front pinch. Others include a flat crown model that carries a slight fore and aft indentation—a good looking compromise between the very popular flat tops and the equally popular center crease styles. One designer has adapted the old familiar "Optimo" shape—with the undented crown and ridge formed lengthwise through the top, long familiar in Panama hats—and used it for a casual felt style.

A FIBER CALLED ramie has been used to create finishes that feature silvery glints in medium and dark shades for sportswear specials. There are also the tried and true traditional felts and shapes, many of which are showing up in new colorings.

Medium to medium-dark shades appear to be the style leaders for fall. These include grays, blue-grays, tawny brown, deep browns and many new softly shaded greens.

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
