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FALL AND WINTER ready to wear is not only more
feminine and flattering than ever, but offer a veritable
voyage of discovery in new lines and new materials.
Light weight luxury is the theme on which Sophie has
played the variations of a virtuoso and her designs will

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FLEMISH COLORS are much to the fore. Brown is predominant, black very strong; and grey remains a favorite in all its nuances. There are reds of all shades and depths. Black and red combinations are frequent, as are those of royal blue with emerald green or with black. The silhouette this season is soft and rounded and features a tapered skirt as contemporary as a parachute just dropped from the stratosphere. The new tapered skirts in wools and silks are marvels of seaming that concentrates fullness over rounded hips, then sections down to a narrow hemline.

Tacking remains prevalent on both silk and wool, covering whole dresses so they look as if made of different fabric, or slimming waistline about full skirts. Band and bow detail is everywhere—on coats, on suits, street dresses, cocktail and evening gowns.
