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WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT

Brain Capacity • Birthmarks • Blood Sweating

Q. Can you overload the brain with information?  
A. No, it hardly seems possible. Brain cells concerned with the learning process are called neurons. A neuron is like a vacuum tube in the new "electric brain" or computing machines you read about. Remarkable as these man-made machines seem, they are like toys compared with the human brain. The most complicated "electric brain" has fewer vacuum tubes than there are neurons in a fishing worm. Doctors estimate that the human brain can store one thousand times as many bits of information as there are neurons.

Q. Are birthmarks ever caused by something that frightens the mother before the baby is born?  
A. No. Unborn babies can be affected by the mother's general health but not by fright.

Q. Can a birthmark be removed?  
A. They can usually be removed but your doctor should decide when and if a birthmark should be treated. A Providence, R. I. doctor made a special study of birthmarks and he thinks that in many cases it's best to wait and see if the birthmark will disappear without treatment. There are advantages and disadvantages to early treatment.

Q. There is an old saying about people "sweating blood." Is this possible?  
A. No, not in normal persons. However, two doctors at the University of Pittsburgh found that sweat glands may get out of commission and secrete a coloring matter that changes the color of sweat. When it is red it looks like the person is "sweating blood."

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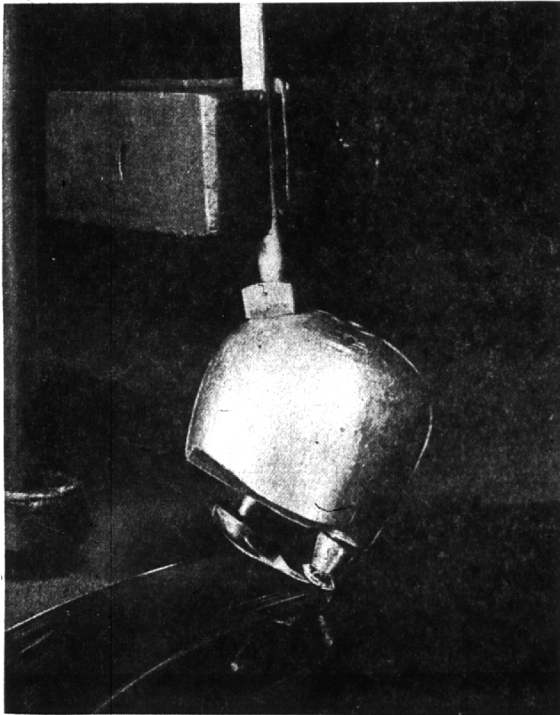
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
