Pass Swimming Pool Ordinance

SOUTHFIELD—Trustee Thomas M. Costello would adapt a township swimming ordinance which becomes effective 30 days after publication.

The new law, which governs any pools deeper than three feet, requires that each pool have a four-foot chain-link fence with not bigger than two-inch openings; self-closing, self-latching gates; and that the pool be not closer than six feet to side or rear lot lines.

OTHER requirements include: a fence enclosing the entire yard may be considered as complying with the regulations; electric wires which pass over the pool must be at least 20 feet high; there must be no direct cross connection with city or home water and the pool water supply; water must be chlorinated, filtered and recirculated every 12 hours.

The pool must be drained when the house is vacated for an extended period, or covered with a cover which can hold 200 pounds; the pool must have adequate supervision; and failure to follow the ordinance may bring \$100 fine or up to 30 days in jail or both.
