Benjamin E. Young, 59, retired, general vice president of the National Bank of Detroit, died July 31 at his residence, 4129 Echo road, Bloomfield township.

He continued as director and consultant of the National Bank after retiring in 1932 after two heart attacks.

Born in Missouri, he came to Detroit in 1933 to join the management of the newly organized National Bank as assistant to the president.

In 1937 he advanced to general vice president and was later director in 1950. Mr. Young wrote books on banking practices and won recognition as a banking authority.

He served as general chairman of the 1944 War Chest campaign, was a past treasurer of the Salvation army in Detroit and was one of the organizers of the United Foundation in 1949.

After serving in the air corps in world war I, he became active in the American Legion and was commander of the Heart of America post in Kansas City.

MR. YOUNG was director of the United Health and Welfare fund of Michigan, the United Community Services and the Detroit Urban League. He was treasurer of the Foundation of Economic Education and a trustee of Henry Ford hospital and the Earhart foundation.

Among the companies for which he was director, are American National Gas, Detroit Steel, Fleet Carrier, Industrial Enterprises, Michigan Consolidated Gas, Penobscot building, Standard Accident insurance, Planet Insurance and Summit Industries.

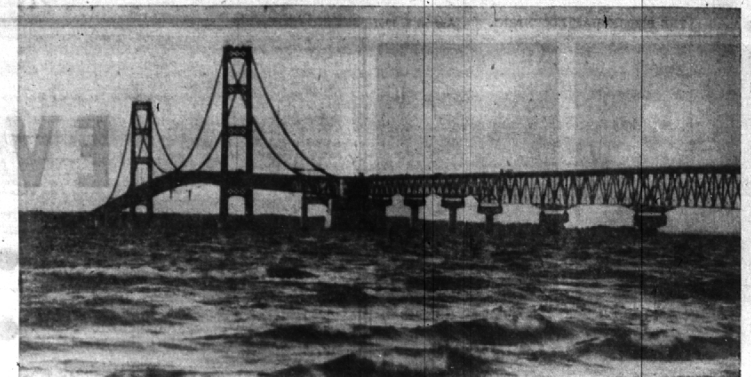
HE WAS HONORED with an honorary doctorate in humanities by Wayne University, where he was an advisor to the school of business administration.

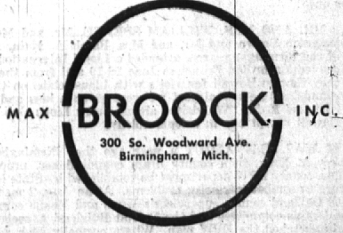
