

Supreme Court Affirms Gravel Pit Decision

The state supreme court has upheld a decision by Circuit Court Judge George B. Hartwick forbidding the operation of a gravel pit in Bloomfield township near East Square Lake road and Adams road. The court decision upheld the township zoning ordinance, the court holding that the pit would be a blight on the neighborhood. The site is surrounded by home developments.

IT WAS the first time a gravel pit case went to the supreme court. Floyd Beardslee of Bloomfield township sought to open the pit after purchasing this because of his present pit, also on Square Lake road, was running out of gravel.

Woodcreek Farms Forms Gov't Units

WOODCREEK FARMS—Woodcreek Farms council proceeded with the business of organizing essential units for the operation of village government at its second regular meeting since incorporation Tuesday night.

Meeting for the first time in its official public place, a large, well appointed room at the Sarah Fisher Home on Inkster road, the council undertook to appoint an assistant for road administrator, Don Wells, who agreed to set up the street program contingent upon the naming of an aide.

RICHARD Norwalk of 27872 Wellington was appointed to assist Wells in administering the almost five miles of village roads which were acquired from the county road commission on July 29. It was expected that Wellington would be declared a primary road shortly and some consideration is being given to a reclassification of Millbrook road also. This would net approximately \$170,000 for two and a tenth miles from the state gasoline and weight tax for maintenance.

A NINE MAN planning commission was also appointed and met to meet with the council at its September meeting. Names for a three year term were Dr. Conrad Lamo, Watson Kinney, and Vernon Flaher; for a two year term, Maurice Tyghem, Ross Flewis and Roy Nelson; for a period of one year, Richard Weedon, Lloyd McKay and Prescott Schlatterbeck.

The group will elect its own chairman and secretary and will assume their duties immediately.

Wendell Brown, attorney, will act as the village's legal counsel, his appointment to run for a period of one year effective July 1, the date set as the beginning of the fiscal year.


