Services were Monday at the Bell Chapel of the William E. Hamilton Co. Her body was sent to Chicago for burial in Graceland cemetery.

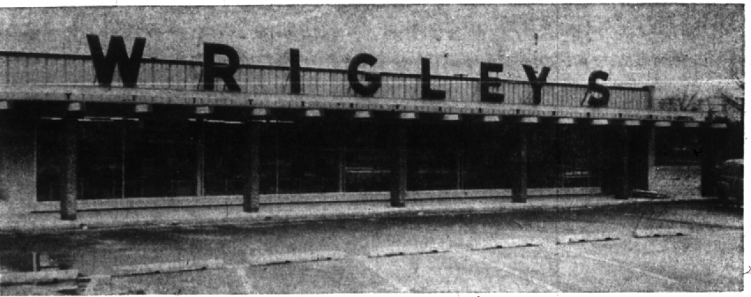
**JOHN M. GREINER**, 64, of 1950 Bradford, Birmingham, died Nov. 27 at William Beaumont hospital after a heart attack.
