Vincent Price is coming to town on Sunday, specifically to sell Detroiters on their own project, the Archives of American Art.

Sponsored by a group of art enthusiasts headed by Mrs. William J. Poplack, of Lake Park, Birmingham, Price will address a group of about 200 in the Franklin Hills home of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Shwayder.

For weeks now, Mrs. Poplack and a committee have been telephoning to talk about the Archives, a national project to make Detroit the world center for research on American art. Formal invitations to the Sunday afternoon affair at 3:30 is starting time—went out last week-end.

several of the committee spent hours in the Archives which are housed in the Detroit Institute of Arts so they could be well versed on every detail of the microfilms and original documents already collected since the program began in 1954.
