HOMER CASE—Republican incumbent. Case was appointed township treasurer last year to succeed Arno L. Hulet who replaced David Anderson as supervisor. A life-long resident of the township, Case was a local landscape contractor for several years. He is a graduate of the American Landscape school. Case is currently treasurer of Bloomfield Lions club and an elder of the Birmingham Church of Christ. Married, he has three children and lives at 1125 Wing Lake road. He is 41.

ERWIN E. LEWIS—Republican. Lewis is an accountant for an automobile dealer in Lake Orion. He attended Alma college and the Business Institute of Pontiac where he studied accounting. He is a World War II veteran, married, and lives at 419 Keating.

TOWNSHIP TRUSTEE. There are two vacancies to this post. There are two trustees on the five-member township board which is the policy making body of the township. Salary is \$25 per meeting. Other board members are supervisor, clerk, and treasurer.

MARK R. KRAUS—Republican incumbent. Appointed to the township board in 1954, Kraus was elected to the post in 1955. For the past two years he has owned a Detroit building materials supply company. Kraus, 60, is married and lives at 709 Williamsburg road.

JAMIE M. MARTIN—Republican. A realtor and insurance agent, Martin has been a resident of the township for the past ten years. He currently serves on the township board of review and previously served two terms as constable. Martin holds a BA degree and also studied law for two years. He has been active in various civic projects sponsored by the Lions club, is active in Boy Scouts and the PTA, a veteran of World War II. Martin, 41, is married and has three children. The Martins reside at 456 Tilbury road.

MARCUS F. SCOTT—Republican. Superintendent of General Motors Truck and Coach division in Pontiac, this is Scott's first bid for public office. He is a member of the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce and the Elks. He is married and lives at 238 Marlborough drive. Scott is 55.

GORDON T. GETSINGER—Republican. A manufacturer's agent in Detroit for the past seven years, Getsinger was formerly assistant business manager for Life magazine in New York City. He received an AB degree from Williams college and master's degree in business administration from Harvard university. Currently, Getsinger serves on the advisory board of the City Country school, Bloomfield Hills. Getsinger, 35, is a veteran of World War II and a Naval reserve Lieutenant. He is married, has three children and lives at 1445 W. Square Lake road.

LORNE G. O'NEIL—Republican. O'Neil is associated with a firm of industrial designers and engineers for the past year and one-half. Formerly he was employed by the process development staff of a Detroit auto firm. O'Neil attended General Motors Institute in Flint. He has served as a member of the Hickory Grove school board from 1953 to 1954, and is past president of Colonial Hills Improvement association. Currently he serves as chairman of the association's plans examining board.

He is also active in the Detroit area Boy Scout Council. O'Neil, 42, is married and has two children. He lives at 146 Eileen.

ALBERT A. CLARK—Republican incumbent. Clark, a resident vice president of an insurance company with offices in Detroit, has been a member of the township board of trustees since 1927. A University of Michigan graduate, Clark, 59, was born in Lansing. He is a veteran of World War I, a member of Bloomfield Open Hunt club and was a member of the School District No. 4 Fractional for 22 years before consolidation. Clark, a former justice of the peace, and his wife live at 5025 N. Adams road.

TOWNSHIP BOARD OF REVIEW. This body meets for a few days every March to review tax assessments and to listen to and settle the complaints of residents on the amount of taxes assessed against their properties. Salary amounts to about \$25 per day.

WALTER J. BEHN—Incumbent. Behn has served on the Board of Review for the past six years and has been a township resident for 35 years. For almost 50 years he has been a consulting engineer in their properties. Salary amounts to about \$25 per day.

HOWARD T. KEATING JR. A land developer, Keating has lived in the township for seven years. He is a graduate of University of Detroit where he received a BS degree in economics. A World War II veteran, Keating, 36, is married, has four children and lives at 3756 W. Lincoln.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE. Duties of a justice are to hear complaints on traffic violations, zoning, and building code, conduct preliminary examinations, prepare warrants and process papers. He serves as the township's principal judicial officer. Salary is on a fee basis.

WILLIAM E. RUDELL—Republican incumbent. An assistant counsel for a Detroit accident insurance company for the past five years, Rudell was formerly with a Detroit law firm. He was elected as township constable in 1955. He holds both the AB and LLB degrees. Rudell, 49, is active in Adams school PTA, is married and has three children. He lives at 4175 Squirrel road.

CLYDE L. FULTON—Republican. A Detroit attorney for the past 31 years, Fulton has served as municipal judge in Highland Park from 1927 to 1935. He holds a bachelor of laws degree and is a member of the Highland Park chamber of commerce and Kiwanis club. Fulton currently serves as secretary of the Meadowlake Civic association. Married, Fulton, 51, lives at 6020 Meadowlake.

LAWRENCE J. MALONEY—Republican. A Pontiac attorney, this is Maloney's first attempt at public office. Graduated from the University of Detroit in 1925 with a bachelor of laws degree, he is a member of the Pontiac chamber of commerce. Maloney, 53, is a widower and lives at 2897 Colonial trail.

HAROLD HELPER—Republican. Helper, a practicing attorney since 1951, was formerly a prosecu-

TOWNSHIP CONSTABLE. There are four constables who are the township peace officers. They serve process papers, warrants and in general work with the justice of the peace. Salary is on a fee basis.

BARL E. RHODES—Incumbent. Rhodes presently serves as township building inspector. He was formerly superintendent of the G. D. Pope estate and has served as constable for a number of years. He was president of Oakland county 4-H clubs for more than 20 years. Rhodes, 60, is married and lives at 643 Franklin road.

RUSSELL PICKERING—Republican incumbent. A local fruit grower, Pickering has served as constable for four consecutive terms. He is a graduate of the Business Institute in Pontiac where he majored in book-keeping and accounting. For a number of years he was active in local 4-H clubs. A life-long resident of the township, Pickering, 57, lives at 7141 Franklin road.

EDWARD N. SCHNEIDER—Republican incumbent. Copy writer for a Detroit advertising agency, Schneider holds an AB degree and is a veteran of the Korean War where he served as a correspondent. In 1954 he was a volunteer worker in United Foundation campaign. Schneider is single and lives at 1430 Inwoods circle. He is 39.

TOWNSHIP HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER. **JASPER B. REID, JR.**—Republican. Apportant for Michigan Bell Telephone Co. in Port Huron since 1954, Reid was formerly a commercial credit analyst for a Detroit bank. He holds AB and MBA degrees from University of Michigan. Reid currently serves as treasurer for the 18th district Young Republicans Club and was a precinct delegate in 1956. Reid, 27, is single and lives at 412 N. Gleanary Road.

Fear S'field May Have to Use Paper Ballots on April 1

SOUTHFIELD—Unless Township Clerk Fannie Adams can borrow or rent about 20 voting machines, residents will have to resort to the old-fashioned paper ballots for the charter commission election April 1.

Bloomfield township officials said Monday night they would rent Southfield about six machines, at \$25 each, for the general Spring election.

Southfield is pressed for machines because they are holding not only the charter election, but another ballot to elect township officers which requires separate machines.

Zoning Board Okays Larger Side Yards

SOUTHFIELD—At a public hearing on raising minimum widths of sideyards last Thursday, zoning board members voted 7-0 in favor of the tighter restrictions.

The measure, sought by Township Trustee Luther Wagner, is approved by township board members, would raise minimum sideyards from 5 feet to seven feet and raise the total requirement for both side yards from 15 to 20 feet.

Zoning board also voted to call to the attention of the township board a motion made May 3, 1956 by Zoning Chairman R. F. Woelfel and approved by the zoning board that all property zoned Residential One (R-1) (the township's minimum classification) be rezoned to R-2.

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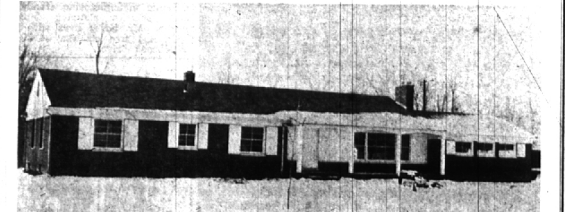
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
