

Franklin Village Vacates Carol Road

FRANKLIN—Councilmen vacated a portion of one street and denied the petition of vacating another at its meeting Monday night.

After two years of council debates, disclamations with planning commissioners, real estate developer George Wellington Smith and church trustees, the Franklin council vacated that portion of Carol road lying easterly of its intersection with Brandingham.

Church trustees now can go ahead with plans for building the addition on the south side of the church.

A PETITION signed by Ellis J. Premo, Mr. and Mrs. Charles M.

Peterson, Mr. and Mrs. John R. Faulkner and Oliver H. Kirk, asking that that portion of Normandy road west of its intersection at Irving be vacated, was denied.

Nick Rosello, planning commission chairman, explained to petitioners present that the planning commission did not recommend the vacation.

One abutting property owner, owning seven acres, objected, he said, and the only reason brought forth for the vacation was that the road would be beautified.

More roads, not fewer are needed in the village, he pointed out, and any existing roads should be kept.

Advise Bloomfield To Cap 12-Inch Well

BLOOMFIELD — Engineers from Hubbell Roth and Clark, engineering consultants, told township officials that 12-inch well drilled recently in Water District No. 10 should be capped because it was only producing 150 gallons per minute while a similar well was pumping 600 gallons a minute.

There are enough wells operating in the area now to meet the ultimate population of that region said the engineers. Ultimate need is seen as 1950 gallons per minute while present pumpaged producing 2,000 gallons a minute, not including the well to be capped.
