After February 28, 1957, real estate taxes may be paid ONLY at the office of the Oakland County Treasurer in Pontiac. If paid between March 1, 1957 and April 15, 1957, a tax certificate must first be secured at the office of the City Treasurer.

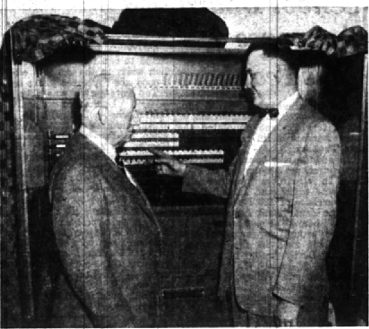
