More than 8,000 invitations to aid the Hungarian Relief are winging their way into mailboxes this week . . . and, more than one-quarter of that amount was prepared by 23 students at Kingswood. They are members of the sophomore class and worked under the careful guidance of Miss Bertha Seifert.

Classroom periods, plus last weekend's leisure hours, were devoted to the worthy project. Reward for their efforts will be complimentary tickets for the gala opening night of the American Ballet Theater on Hungarian Freedom Day, Friday, March 15.

THE BALLET will be presented at 8:30 p.m. in the Masonic auditorium and will benefit the Detroit Hungarian churches and Societies organization.

The Detroit Hungarian churches and Societies organization, a non-profit corporation, has undertaken responsibility for traveling expenses, support, medical care, education, employment and assimilation of the refugees—numbering about 500 so far.
