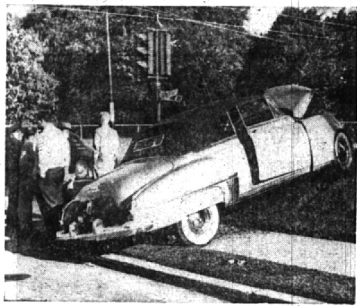


HE THOUGHT HE WAS RIGHT
