### Describes Days At Hungarian Refugee Camp

A letter received recently from Rev. Dr. Emil Kuntz describes the busy days he and Mrs. Kuntz are spending at Camp Kilmer, N.J. The first Baptist church minister has been granted a four to seven week leave of absence by the congregation to enable him to serve as Protestant chaplain at the camp where thousands of Hungarian refugees are received daily.

His letter to his friends at First Baptist Church reads: "Dear Friends, This letter is being written in one of the barracks in 'Kilmer Reception Center for Hungarian Refugees'. It is early in the morning and the place is already buzzing with activity. But before I am caught in the whirl of today's business, I am getting off this epistle to you.

We had our first glimpse of Kilmer the day we arrived, after traveling our way through the 'big snow' of Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Mrs. Kuntz and I drove out here with Dr. Dean Goodwin of the American Baptist Convention publicity office. Over the mention of the camp is a huge sign in Hungarian 'ISTEN HOZTA' - 'WELCOME' (God brought you).

It was like coming into a sprawling Hungarian village of barracks apartments. Everywhere were many signs, in both English and Hungarian, identifying buildings, giving directions, noting warnings, etc. Everywhere we went were people scurrying to and fro, near-

Our thoughts and prayers often reach out toward all of you back home. Also, we are concerned about the Hungarian friends you have adopted for helpful service. We are sure you are doing all in your power to keep them busy and happy there.
