## S.L. Ferguson Retires March 1

SOUTHFIELD — Detroit Edison treasurer Stewart L. Ferguson, widely-known Detroit business executive and civic leader, will retire March 1 after more than 43 years of service with the company's system committees for United A native Detroit, Ferguson joined Detroit Edison as a summer-time employee in 1910. After receiving his mechanical engineering degree from the University of Michigan in 1914, he went to work full-time in the company's meter department.

In 1915, he transferred to the property department, where he worked for about three years as an assistant in the property engineering department before joining the U. S. Navy to serve during World War I. He returned to Edison as property engineer in 1919.

He was appointed assistant secretary of the company in 1941, was given added responsibilities as assistant general accountant in 1950, and was elected treasurer in 1952.

Ferguson is a member of the Detroit Board of Commerce, a member of the policy and finance committees of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and has served on several committees for United Community Services. He is a member of the Economic Club of Detroit, the Detroit Chapter of Tax Executives Institute, the Engineering Society of Detroit and the finance and investor relations committee for Edison Electric Institute.

His other affiliations include membership in the Detroit Yacht Club, Pony Hollow Golf Club, and Berkshire Hills Protective association. Ferguson, who is married, has three children and five grandchildren, lives at 2395 Woodland drive.

He has headed a 10-month staff organization to commemorate the nationalization of the Suez Canal. It will be stopped before the year ends.

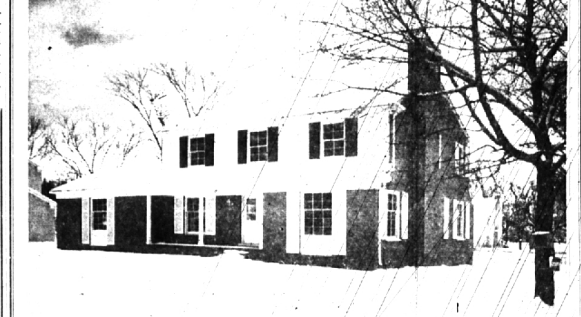
