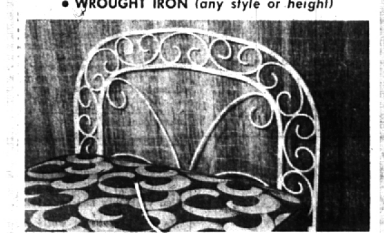

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Set Hearings On Rezoning March 18, 25

Following up recommendations made by the planning board last week, Birmingham city commissioners Monday night set public hearing dates on rezoning of several properties.

They scheduled for March 18 a hearing on 12 lots in East Maple Gardens. City plan board has recommended that the lots, facing on Maple road west of Coolidge, be classified multiple family instead of present single family residence zoning.

Attorneys for several Maple property owners had requested a business zoning of the block between Coolidge and St. Andrews. But plan board members felt multiple family for the two-block strip would be better for the entire area.

Delay More Money For Big Evergreen Until April Vote

An additional \$2,400 was advanced this week by Birmingham as its share of \$50,000 more needed for preliminary engineering on the proposed 12 towns drain.

City commissioners, however, held up for the time being a \$12,357 advance for further engineering on the Big Evergreen. They said they would wait the April 1 vote in Southfield on a 1.3-mill tax to pay Southfield's share of the proposed project.

If that vote carries, it is quite possible the Big Evergreen will go through. If the vote fails, Birmingham undoubtedly will put its money into the North Evergreen disposal sewer project, already pretty well along.

N. Evergreen authority members will discuss status of both plans at a meeting next Tuesday.

ALSO SLATED March 18 is rezoning four lots on Floyd street near Lincoln from ironing bonanza to business A. Plan board members recommend approval.

March 25 another hearing will take up rezoning 11 lots at Woodward and Bedding roads to multiple family residence. Owner Samuel Frankel has told city planners he intends to build terrace apartments on the property, similar to his adjoining Colonial Court.

Ford dealer Harold Turner appeared before the plan board members last week to request rezoning of three lots at Bowers and Elm from single family to business B. Planners will study the request and make a recommendation at their March 20 meeting.

Consolidate Water Dept Ordinances

No need for five ordinances when one will do a better job, Birmingham city commission said in consolidating water department regulations into a single ordinance.

Principal change is a stiffening of air conditioning restrictions, which now become the same as in the city of Detroit, from which Birmingham receives half of its water supply.

All air conditioning users have six years in which to convert to water-conserving type of equipment, on face unusually heavy annual charges.
