

# Internations Theme For WILPF Dinner

An evening abroad is contemplated with pleasurable interest by Oakland County Branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, as its members plan for International Night, Saturday, March 2nd, to be held in the Banquet Room of the Pontiac Federal Savings Building, 761 West Huron Street, Pontiac.

The international theme of the evening will be enhanced by a buffet dinner prepared from United Nations Cookbook recipes, such dishes as Lasagne Verdi Al Forno from Italy, Loh Paj Kwut from China, the Bulgarian dish, and Picadillo Cubano from Cuba. In keeping with the policy of the Women's International League of strong support for an international program of mutual assistance on economic and human problems in vast under-developed areas of the world, the Oakland County branch will have an after-dinner speaker, Prof. Hy Fish, whose topic will be "Preparing Peoples for Progress—The Human Aspect of Technical Assistance."

**PROF. FISH**, a faculty member of Roosevelt college, Chicago, is an international productivity expert, having spent over a year in India as Chief of Mission, where he helped establish India's National Productivity Center and designed a program for future development. He has had many long and short term missions abroad for the U. S. Government and the International Labor Organization under the technical assistance program of the United Nations. Prof. Fish has been in Israel on four different missions since 1959 as advisor to the Government of Israel on Productivity, and at the conclusion of his last mission there, the Israeli government presented him with a scroll of honor for his accomplishments.

MR. FISH has been accompanied on his extensive travels in the

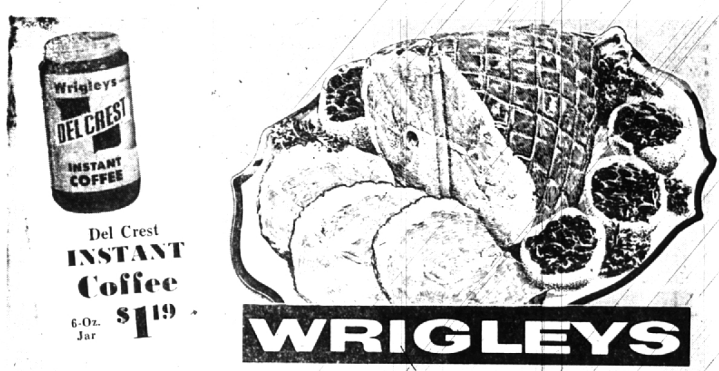

### MARCH... LION or LAMB?

With an apprehensive glance at the overcast sky we venture to make the following suggestions:

This is an ideal time to apply fertilizer to your lawn. It is a good practice to get the fertilizer on just before the ground thaws in March. In this manner the plant food will be available to the young grass when it begins to grow in the early Spring. To aid in this program we recommend a fertilizer with this analysis: 10—NITROGEN... 6—PHOSPHORIC ACID... 4—POTASH.

In the case of grass, the order of predominance is... NITROGEN, PHOSPHORIC ACID and POTASH. NITROGEN should be present in the greatest amount since it DEVELOPS and gives COLOR to the leaf plant. Since grass, of all useful plants, has the longest active growing season it is necessary that nitrogen should predominate and be available during most of this growing season. PHOSPHORUS is also a dominant element and is necessary as a contributing factor to LIVING PLANT TISSUE and is ESSENTIAL to the DEVELOPMENT OF GOOD ROOT STRUCTURE. POTASH is necessary to enable the plant to produce CARBOHYDRATES that are used by the plant for GROWTH ENERGY and STRUCTURAL MATERIAL.

The above explanation is inserted by request and, strangely enough, it activates forgotten facts in this writer's noggin.

**DO'S and DON'TS**

Never prune evergreens during freezing weather... Don't trim in winter any of those evergreens which make one annual shoot terminated by a prominent bud, like pine, spruce and fir.

Do prune dead, broken or badly diseased limbs from apple, cherry, peach and shade trees... If you forgot to do it last fall. Don't forget that in order to help prevent scale, mites, red spider, aphids and many other pests, apply SCALECID, on trees and shrubs, as soon as we have at least 24 hours of above freezing temperatures.
