Community Concert Assoc. To Celebrate Tenth Year

The Southern Oakland County Community Concert Association is celebrating its tenth anniversary this year, and so, at popular request, they are presenting at their next concert, the virtuoso pianist Jorge Bolet, who was soloist at the first concert of the Association in January, 1948. Mr. Bolet will play at the Royal Oak Dondoro high school auditorium on Sunday, Feb. 10 at 8:15 p.m.

Cuban-born, Bolet has long considered himself an American, as he received his musical education at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia; served in U. S. armed forces, and has been a citizen for many years.

AFTER making his New York debut in 1933, and later graduating from Curtis Institute, he was sent to Europe by the Cuban government for a year of advanced study and a recital tour in London, Paris, Amsterdam, Vienna and Berlin. Back in the USA in 1937, he won the coveted Naumburg Award.

When Cuba entered World War II, Bolet enlisted in the Cuban army and was sent to Washington at Assistant Military Attache of the Embassy there. His mission was to promote cultural understanding between the two republics. After his commission was voided in 1944, he was commissioned in the U. S. Army, and sent to Japan in the Army of Occupation.

IN TOKYO, Lt. Bolet—only artist before the public who is a veteran of two armies—made music history by conducting the first production ever seen in Japan of the Gilbert and Sullivan classic, "The Mikado." While on duty in Japan, he also appeared repeatedly as

soloist with the Nippon Philharmonic.

Since his release from military service and his return to the concert stage, Jorge Bolet has won steady, increasing recognition as an artist. He has toured Europe, Mexico, Central America, the West Indies and Latin America, as well as the U. S. and Canada in recitals, and as soloist with every major symphony orchestra.

With their guide in Mexico City, Mr. and Mrs. Hussey visited the bull fighting arena and were startled to see coats, hats jackets, flowers and even milk stools thrown into the ring as excited devotees of the national sport expressed their approval.

Through the guide the Husseys obtained the horns and hooves of one of the bulls slain that afternoon. Mounted on an oval plaque they will lend authenticity to the Mexican decor of their recreation room.

HIGHLIGHT of the trip for Mrs. Hussey was Christmas Eve in a Mexican home. Food for this occasion is prepared entirely by the men of the family and served on special Christmas china which is brought out only during Christmas season.

Since Mrs. Hussey did all of her Christmas shopping in Mexico, she is now busy sorting and wrapping her purchases for belated delivery. Among her purchases this year were graceful copper candelabra, modern Liza designs in silver jewelry, hand woven baskets and quaint dolls in national Mexican costumes.
