Set, building, lighting, costumes, make-up, properties and other production phases will be covered.

"The Desperate Hours" is the story of three fugitives that take over a family's home in their attempt to elude the police. It opens February 8th at St. Dunstan's Playhouse—the Cranbrook Pavilion on Loon Pine road, Bloomfield Hills.

**STEVE BOOTH**, a Birmingham resident and himself a member of St. Dunstan's, has been shooting color motion pictures of the group ever since rehearsals first started. The film to be used on "Hobbies in Action" will show all phases of the production of "The Desperate Hours," right up to the time the curtain rises on opening night. For the first time, the audience will be made aware of the great amount of hard work these amateurs, and others like them in similar community theaters, put into a play that runs only four nights.

**ST. DUNSTAN'S** Guild is unusual among amateur theater groups in that it not only keeps its finances in the black through proceeds from its five productions a year, but it donates a full-year scholarship annually to one of three Cranbrook institutions.
