Settle Alley Condemnation

Agreement was reached this week by the City and John W. Gaffl that the rear portion of his Hamilton street lot need for alley purposes is worth \$2,800.

A consent decree will be entered in court, ending a condemnation suit for the needed area.

A similar negotiated settlement was made with Gaffl for another part of his lot needed for widening Park street entrance onto Hamilton.

The \$1,800 figure was close to city appraisals, according to the city finance department.

Sprague Drain Cleaning to End 7-Year Battle

A public hearing for property owners' complaints on assessments being levied for the cleaning of the Sprague drain has been set for Wednesday, Jan. 16, in the office of Daniel J. Barry, Oakland county drain commissioner.

Individual assessments should be determined by the end of the week as the cleaning contract was expected to be awarded to the low bidder this week. The assessment of approximately \$12,000 will be levied over a five-year period, first payment coming due in December, 1957.

The drain, one of the county's oldest, was established in 1850, and runs south of Square Lake road in Troy, north across Square Lake and South boulevard to Auburn where its branches coast on Alford street, a quarter of a mile west of Crooks road.

THE ASSESSMENT includes a new pipe on Auburn on the west side of Allendale school, which has experienced serious difficulties from drain waters.

The cleaning will mark the end of a seven-year effort to have the drains worked upon. After petitions first were filed seven years ago, court complaints on the assessment dragged past the time allowed by the Michigan drain law for work to be done. A year ago petitions again were signed and bids taken after a county board of determination approved necessity for cleaning.

Assessment notices have been posted in the area, but individual notices are not being sent out, as they are not required by law. Property owners have 10 days to appeal assessments.

Youth Stands Mute

James Williamson, 17, of 2729 Dorchester road, Birmingham, stood mute when arraigned in Oakland county circuit court Monday on charges of larceny from a building. A plea of not guilty was entered by the court. Trial date has not yet been set. Williamson's bond, continued at \$200, was not furnished.

Paper Ballots Give Way to Voting Machines in Hills

Bloomfield Hills city commission voted unanimously Tuesday night to buy four automatic voting machines, two for each precinct, to be used in the April election.

The commission accepted a small triangle of land at the southwest corner of the intersection of Lone Pine road and Lone Pine court from Percy K. Loud.

The gift insures city ownership of the small section which lies adjacent to the property along the south side of Lone Pine road given to the city a few years ago by Cranbrook Foundation.

Mayor C. G. Eden suggested that Loud be sent a letter expressing the commission's appreciation.

KEPHART SAID a status report has been filed regarding the pending case against Bloomfield Hills for pollution of the Rouge River. The report states that the city has elected to join with adjacent communities in the North Evergreen sewage plant and that engineering delays have prevented the city's meeting the court deadline.

Commissioners refused to accept the offer of a road known as Wish-

bone drive from George Bee, builder and developer.

After Kephart said the road lacked gravel and its banks required work, the commissioners decided to inform Bee that it would reconsider his offer after the spring break-up if he complies with city road standards.

THE ROAD is located in a development along the east side of Opoyko road near St. Hugo's church.
