

Smithsonian Exhibits Croze Photos

The honor of an invitation to exhibit his photographic work at Washington's Smithsonian Institution has been extended to Cranbrook Photographer Harvey Croze, of 380 Lone Pine road, Bloomfield Hills.

A one-man show containing 40 to 50 of Croze's pictorial photographs went on display at the national museum Jan. 1, and will remain through Feb. 28.

Croze has also been honored with a bid to speak before the National Photographic society, Washington, D.C., and plans to make a gallery talk before the well-known photographers' group while his work is on exhibition.

CROZE SAID THIS week that the invitation to exhibit at the Smithsonian came from the institution's curator of graphic arts. He said his display contains pictorial and abstract photographs taken during the last 15 years. The group includes several award-winners, and a number of pictures which have been shown in nations around the world.

"Some of the pictures were exhibited in such places as Japan, England, and even behind the Iron Curtain—there doesn't seem to be any Iron Curtain in photography," Croze said.

THE CRANBROOK photographer occasionally exhibits paintings as well as photos, for he began his career with the study of art and design, intending to become an artist. Later his interest turned to industrial photography, and he joined the General Motors Photographic department.

He became the Cranbrook Foundation photographer in 1942.

"Of course, I included several photographs taken on the Cranbrook grounds in my Smithsonian show." Croze is married, and his 14-year-old son, Harvey, Jr., attends Cranbrook school.
