

Can Take More MSU Extension Class Members

Interested adults still may enroll in the Michigan State University extension course to be taught this winter term at Birmingham. Additional enrollments will be accepted this coming Monday night when the class meets at Birmingham High School at 7 P.M.

In response to local requests, Michigan State is offering a course at Birmingham in "Principles of Curriculum Development." The course, to be taught by Dr. E. S. Michelson, assistant superintendent of schools in charge of instruction, at Livonia, held its organizational meeting Monday.

Information about the course may be obtained from the office of the local superintendent of schools or from the MSU instructor at the next class session.

THE COURSE will grant three term hours of graduate or undergraduate credit. Permission generally will be granted to adults who wish to attend the course but not for credit.

This MSU course here is part of an overall Michigan State program to offer credit and non-credit courses during the evening across the state. Taught by various departments of the campus, the off-campus adult program is coordinated by the continuing education service.

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Gas Distribution Is Explained To Army Reserves

As part of their training in restoring public utilities in war devastated areas, 80 Army reserves of the 39th Civil Affairs Military Government unit met last week with Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. experts in the company's auditorium to study the gas utility's operations and solutions to peace time problems.

Birmingham area members of this group are Col. Bruce G. Booth, 448 Parklane, commanding officer of the group; Major Eustace Rucinski, 2300 Buckingham, and Capt. Ellis Phillips, 17500 Avilla, Southfield township.

A. V. Brashear, Michigan Consolidated's assistant manager of operations, in charge of the program, welcomed Col. Booth and his men.

COMPANY engineers showed the reservists how the city's gas supply gets here from Texas and Louisiana, how it is routed to markets, how it can be stored for future use, and how it is distributed to homes, shops and factories.

Armed with this information, the reservists will return to their headquarters at Fort Wayne where they report once each week.

They may find civilian gas utility problems to be a "potentially war time situation where they might be called upon at some time in the future to fulfill the mission of a military government overseas.

This class training will be further aided during field exercises at summer camp next summer.

Sure, we all know that sometimes it doesn't seem that what the law says is "fair." But we can be pretty sure that a government of laws will mete out justice more often than that which might come from the whims of a ruler.

That's why our ancestors insisted on the Bill of Rights—but that's another story. What I'm thinking of right now is that under a government of laws, decisions in courts are based on evidence and not on anything else.

So, it's good to know just what may be taken into consideration as "evidence."

FOR EXAMPLE, if a lawyer brings the trial admits that some statement of fact made by the other side is true, or if the lawyers on both sides, either before or during the trial, agree that certain things are true, the jury must accept the fact's admitted.
