They were out-voted by the other board members who approved of Marcotte's proposed three-man clinic with two part-time doctors.

Marcotte said after the meeting that he would not develop any of the other land and that the commercial development did not mean other commercial projects would be constructed in the same area.

"I'm living here. I want this thing to be nice. It will be nice," said Marcotte.
