Norman Crank, Franklin treasurer, reported the building department self-sustaining and receipts have exceeded expenditures by \$800-\$900 the past year.

Councilman Hyde Reviews Rubbish Rules for Residents

FRANKLIN — Councilman Homer Hyde believes the time has come for a review of rubbish collection in the village and the working out of new arrangements. The rubbish collector has 406 homes on his list, but Hyde, counting houses in Franklin village finds there are 586 homes.

"Next month," Hyde points out, "we will have to set up a new budget and we don't want to set up one amount only to find it isn't enough."

Besides Hyde is tired of hearing complaints and believes home owners should review the rubbish rules. "The collector," Hyde said firmly, "won't pick up rubbish mixed with garbage. And he doesn't have to. People are violating the rules of pickup when they put garbage out with rubbish."

The rubbish should be put in bushel baskets or in boxes no larger than heavier than one man can pick up. Big things like stoves—and there have been stoves, Hyde said—will not be picked up.

Franklin rubbish collection is held the first Saturday of each month.

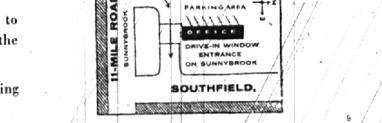
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
