

### Delay Parking Lot Ordinance Penalty Until August 31

Parking lots which have not been properly surfaced and drained won an eight-month extension this week.

Birmingham city commissioners postponed penalty provisions until next Aug. 31 on the recommendation of City Manager Harold Schone.

Approved two years ago, the ordinance required lots on which a fee is charged or which are open to the general public to be adequately drained and surfaced by Dec. 31, 1956.

Several of the 36 non-conforming lots are under contract for improvement or have only technical violations which can be corrected when better weather arrives.
