

5-B Mother's March Workers to Issue Facts on Vaccine

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When workers participating in the mothers' march on polio vaccine you the night of Jan. 31, they will offer more than an opportunity to contribute to the 1957 March of Dimes, according to P. G. Burnett, campaign director for Birmingham.

The mothers will leave at each home a special folder prepared by the national March of Dimes committee, explaining the Salk program and urging every family to get these anti-polio shots.

The folder will also provide a permanent place for recording dates members of the family received polio vaccine shots. Thus every family will have in one place a complete record of protective measures taken against polio.

Captains and lieutenants for next week's march will meet tonight at 8 at Birmingham Community House to receive their kits of working materials and supplies of Salk leaflets for distribution to the mothers' march workers.

"We expect a large turnout at our county convention because of the high interest in the elective offices at stake April 1," Ritchie said.

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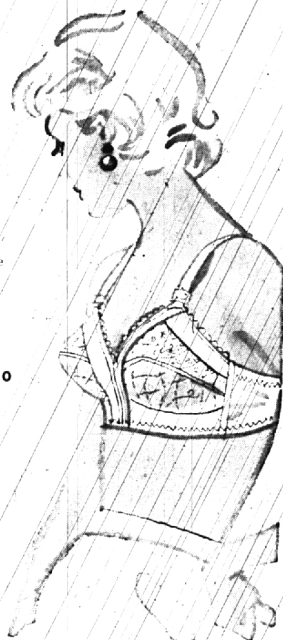
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
