## BHS Pair Will Debate For City Championship

The city high school debate championship of the Detroit metropolitan area will be determined Tuesday when two Birmingham high school debaters meet a pair from University of Detroit high school. The debate is scheduled at 8:15 p.m. at the Detroit school.

Representing Birmingham high school debaters, who have placed first in the northern division with an 8-0 record, will be Helel Cortright and David Karns.

They will be challenged on the negative side of the question of 90 per cent farm parities by Joseph Deat and John Calahan, whose U of D team took top priority in the southern division with a 7-1 season.

JUDGES WILL BE George Bohman, James McMonagle, and Richard Dean, from Wayne State university's speech department.

Along with their 8 wins, no loss record in the metropolitan league, Birmingham high school debaters won seven and lost only one dual in debates with other schools in the Michigan high school forensic association.

Helel Cortright, a senior, has won honors in speech competitions during here three years at the high school.

AS A JUNIOR SHE won first place in the Michigan high school forensic association district and regional dramatic debating contests, and \$125 in bonds in four Hearst oratory contests, placing second in the final state contest. She is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Rupert L. Cortright, of 2366 Northlawn, Birmingham.

HELEN'S TEAMMATE, David Karns, is a transfer student from Dayton, O., where he studied debated in the national forensic league. He won approximately 40 of the 50 debates he entered there. He also qualified for the National Merit scholarship.

In the high school's last regular debate of the season with Ann Arbor, Helen and David won their debate, while Martin Weinreich and Bob Yingling on the negative lost, giving the school its only defeat of the season.

Winners of Tuesday's debate will enter the state high school debate tournament.
