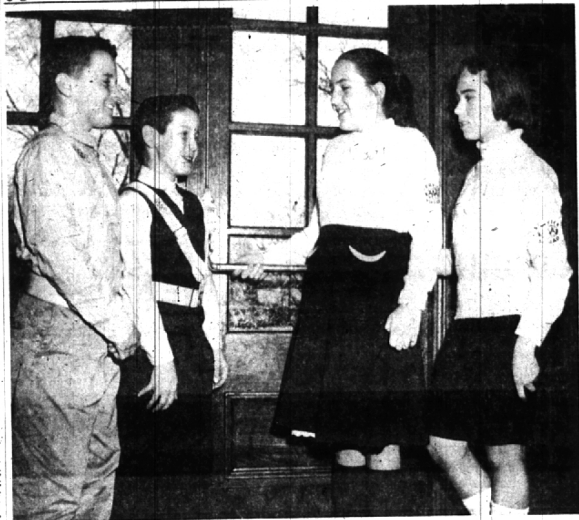
Dateline: Derby

Adams School Avoids Politics in Vote

"Who are you going to vote for?" That was the burning question on nearly every student's lips at Adams school recently. The voting involved no names, ballots or politics.

Instead each student voted only for the numbers worn by his favorite service squad girl and safety patrol boy. For several weeks before the election to name the outstanding member of each volunteer group, each girl and boy involved wore a number as he performed his duty.

When results were tallied, service squad girls No. 56 and No. 1 had heaped on the greatest number of votes in their category. They are winner Trudy App, 11, of 448 Madison, and runner-up Joan Stroth, 11, of 30555 Greenfield. Both girls are fifth graders.

MAX WALLACE'S NUMBER came up most often in the safety patrol boy category, while Dave Kitterman was runner-up. Ten-year-old Max, a fifth grader, lives at 4810 Dover road, Haywood, Wilminton, is 12 years old and a sixth grader.

Their election was the first in a newly-inaugurated plan for students to vote about once a month for the "safety" and "service squad" of their choice.

Organized through the school's student council president, Max Wallace, the program's purpose, according to Principal Hugh Blosser, is "to get the idea to the children that these young boys and girls are out there to give service and to guard their safety—not necessarily as a police action."

WHILE THE 77 patrol boys guard the students' safety at street crossings, the 60 service squad girls watch for danger inside the school building.

Working on a rotating basis, each service squad member takes her post at one of 20 stations near doors, in halls, and on stairways during the 20 minutes just before

morning and afternoon classes, she watches the swarm of pupils making their way past her to their rooms.

If she sees a pupil running in the hall, taking two steps at a time on the stairways, or engaging in any practice that might lead to an accident, she halts the violator.

They have to. How else will they know what number to vote for when the next election comes up?
