THE STUDENT RECEIVES \$12 monthly spending money from the AFS, but Christmas and extra expenses are the responsibility of the family, the letter said. Through student contributions, the school pays for the exchange student's school bus fare, school lunches, books, class rings, Washington trip and activity ticket.

The student must have a bed of his own, but may share a room. He cannot drive a car.
