

BHS Social Clubs Elect Officers For New Semester

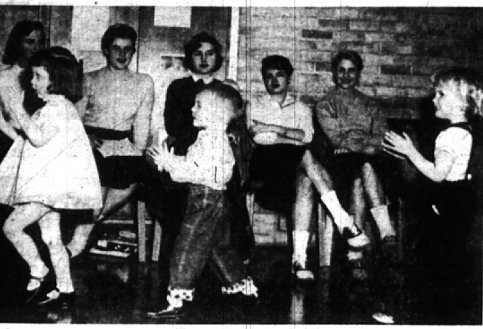
With the changing of the semester, new officers will preside over many of Birmingham high school's social clubs.

Dr. Wendy Mowat might supervise the children's rest period on Tuesday, then help serve them refreshments Wednesday.
