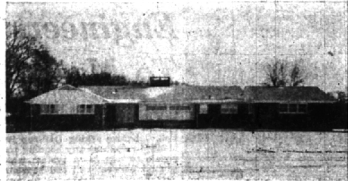


Announce Bloomfield CD Meetings in Feb.

recommendations to the township board. This body is in the organizational stage at this time.

About the Evergreen district for solving pollution problems, Hulet said, "We've got to go through this with that. I think it will be underway by the end of the year."

One advantage Hulet has is his association with an experienced board of trustees. Most of those on the board have been serving the township longer than 75 per cent of its residents have lived in the township.

HULET HIMSELF has been serving the township as a justice of the peace, township treasurer, and recently as supervisor, since 1953.

Albert Clark, trustee, has been holding a post on the board since 1927, while Robert H. Dudley, township clerk, has been on the board since April, 1947.

Latest members to join the veteran board are Mark R. Kraus, appointed trustee in 1954 and re-elected in 1955, and Homer W. Case, who last year succeeded Hulet as treasurer after Hulet became supervisor.

"**THE CASE**" is the best assistant I've had since I became supervisor," said Hulet who added that, "The present board is very congenial and go along with my ideas, but they are not a rubber stamp."

A good portion of the weighty problems that are faced by the township board can be seen by

comparing statistics of 1950 with present-day figures.

In 1950 there were 3,851 residents in Bloomfield township. Present conservative estimates place the township's population at 15,000 or about four times more people than in 1950.

SINCE THE beginning of 1950 4,322 building permits have been issued, and Hulet estimates that 90 per cent of these permits were home construction, or additions.

This huge influx of people, which has already brought need for added schools and services such as police and fire protection, showed only slightly during 1956 and indications point to continued home construction for an indefinite period.

Fortunately Bloomfield township has a board that so far has been able to narry the builders' thrust and keep a high standard for residents in the area.

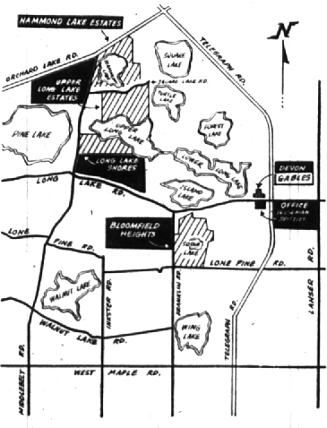
