Will-O-Way Playhouse Presents "Bus Stop"

Will-O-Way Playhouse undertook its most difficult play of the season to date on Monday night according to Donald A. Yates, when Director Bill Merrill and company started William Inge's "Bus Stop" on its two-week run.

The play by Pulitzer Prize winner Inge is a strangely off-beat under-written, yet persistently appealing drama, which holds its focus on an assorted group of common folk thrown together in an isolated Missouri town by a snowstorm and a bus delay.

These are typical Inge characters—humble, unpretentious, but infected with a common "joie de vivre" that motivates their intense (and, as with the cowboy Bo) sometimes extravagant behavior.

BO, played by Danny Simpson, is an outspoken sort—rustic and then some—who is literally kidnapping a modestly talented Kansas City night club singer. The

Janet Simpson, as Grace's young waitress, Elma, was charming in her standard portrayal of a female under forty. And playing the lonely lecher to her innocence was Burton Wright as Dr. Lyman. Mr. Wright got better as he went along and created a truly poignant moment late in the play.

Mady Correll and Barney O'Rourke were solid naturals as the playfully romancing proprietress and bus driver. Robert Dale was impressive as the sheriff in a minor role.

SPECIAL PRAISE among members of a cast which distinguished itself must go to Richard Davies who, as Bo's friend and counsel, Virgil, did his finest job of the season. He grew in dignity and importance as the drama progressed; and when, at the end, Bo and Cherie left for Montana he remained on the stage as Inge's symbol with full control of the great powers the playwright fused into his role.
