want an end to flooded basements; go along with the project; or take their storm water to the Rouge at a higher cost and with the possible risk of facing injunctions from flooded communities in the lower Rouge valley.

ABOUT TWO-THIRDS of the Southfield area was not previously proposed for the 12-Town system but, according to Barry, is a natural part of the Royal Oak drainage district. It would add an additional \$3,200,000 to the \$38 million drain program.

Township Supervisor Eugene Swen, asked if the township was getting \$4 million worth for their money said the proposed system was the best that Southfield could get for the money involved.

Barry indicated that the \$4 million by special assessment would be backed up by a voted general assessment to be levied in case of default by benefited residents. Otherwise bond buyers might turn down the bonds, he said.

RESIDENTS were told, too, that future expansion of the system, which would cost more, was safeguarded by township, county and state approval of any expansion plans and the State would take measures to protect the project as they have laid it out.

Swen asked why building was not halted, Swen said those who paid for drains in the area have the right to use that drain. Twelve Township officials said the State would cut off building when the proposed system was at capacity.

It was pointed out that any sewers needed to connect with the proposed drain would cost residents extra money through special assessment.
