

### Charge Five With Area Burglaries

**TROY** — Five men have been involved in a series of burglaries in Troy, Madison Heights, Hazel Park and St. Clair homes dating back to October, 1956, according to Troy Police Chief David E. Grattopp.

One of three men held by Macomb county officials, Charles Vostinar, 30, of Highland Park, was referred to by Grattopp as the "coach" of the other four.

Vostinar, who manages a Sinclair gas station at 2007 Rochester road, Troy, had served time in Jackson prison for safe-cracking, Grattopp said.

Held with him are Charles Bickel, 20, of 2726 Iowa, and Frank Marizan, 24, of Highland Park.

Also in custody are Thomas Powell, 21, of 565 Troywood, and David Kendall, 31, of 1809 E. Wallace, held by Madison Heights police.

Grattopp said the men worked in interchangeable pairs and were responsible for the October, 1956 break-in of Tony Paul's home at 57 E. Maple in which six outboard motors, valued at \$17,000 were stolen. Five of the six motors have been recovered.

"They also broke into Vostinar's station, proving that there is no bond among thieves," said Grattopp.

### Boy, 8, Drowns In Shallow Water At Michigan Camp

Despite efforts of two physicians who happened to be at the scene when the tragedy occurred, eight-year-old James Truman Barnard, Jr., 4090 Kennesaw, Birmingham, drowned in shallow water of Lake Michigan on Wednesday of last week.

Jamie, as he was known, had been taking a swimming lesson with 23 other boys at Stoneycroft camp near Shelby, Mich. As the lesson ended, he asked permission to go back to the water to wash sand from his feet and face.

A counselor told the parents that it was only a minute later that he saw the boy lying face down in two feet of water. Belief was that he had drowned.

**A R T I F I C I A L R E S P I R A T I O N** was applied at the scene and he was taken to Shelby hospital where a resuscitator was used.

Born Dec. 31, 1948, he was a pupil at Adams school and a member of the First Presbyterian church Sunday school. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James T. Barnard, and a sister, Eliza, 12.

Arrangements were by the Massey Bailey funeral home.

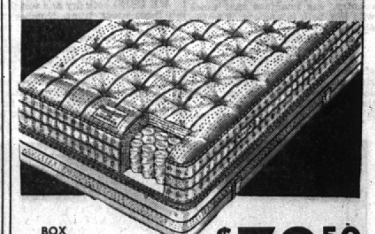
