Just Passing Through

You'll Like City's New Police Station

If you renew your driver's license—or go to jail—after next month, you'll like the city's up-to-date police headquarters.

Birmingham police expect to move into new, modern quarters in the old fire department wing of the municipal building about August 15, when remodeling work is expected to be completed.

The new quarters increase by 50 to 60 per cent the space now occupied by the 30 police officers and six civilian employees.

The new floor plan has been arranged to keep areas used by the public entirely separate from rooms in which prisoners are held.

THE PUBLIC will enter the station through a door opening onto Pierce street, or via the municipal building's main entrance on Martin street.

A large room to the left of the Pierce street entrance will house the police communications desk and a long counter where applications for driver's licenses will be taken.

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley's office will be at the right of the Pierce street entrance.

PRISONERS WILL be brought into the station via the Merrill street side of the building, where large overhead doors for the fire department garage have been replaced by brick wall. Patrolmen bringing in prisoners will be admitted to the locked door through a remote control device at the communications desk.

Other features of the new quarters include a special interrogation room, an identification room where persons placed under arrest will be photographed and fingerprinted, a large jail with a corner barred off as a separate cell for unruly prisoners.

A WAITING ROOM for the public will open onto the detective bureau and the offices to be shared by the juvenile officer and the lieutenant in charge of staff and services.

A "photographic dark room, a squad room containing lockers, a room where commanding officers will confer as new shifts go on duty, a firearms room for loading guns, and meter repair room will be located in the basement.

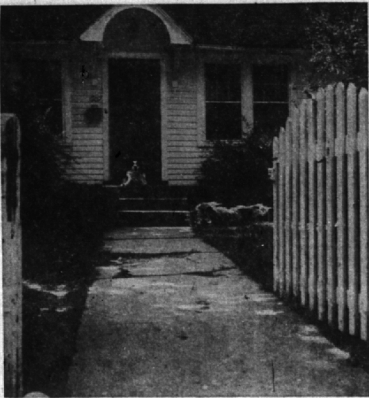
