THE BOARD'S 1957-58 budget lists \$18,450 in expenses with \$4,500 anticipated from swimming fees.

Said Mayor Roberts: "Setting of recreation fees is part of the recreation board's responsibility. There is nothing the city commission can pass on or consider."

"Nevertheless, at the time these fees were considered, a lot of thought was given to them. There is only so much money we can spend, and not enough of it for all we'd like. We get it either from the public at large through taxes, or from the people who participate in the recreational activity."

"If we cut the fee, we face the possibility of cutting some other part of the program. Seems every one wants recreation, but no one wants to pay for it."
