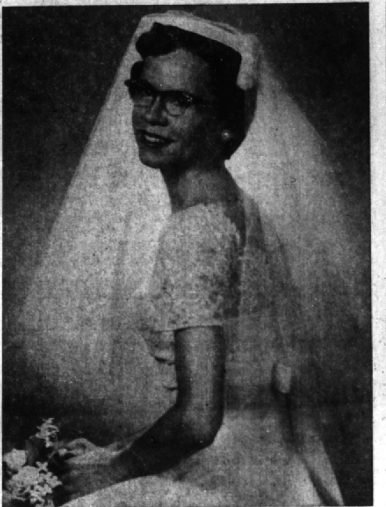

Linnea Swanson, Olof Karlstrom Wed in Mexico

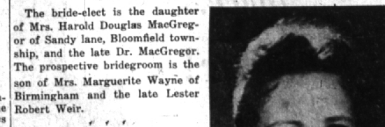
