Violators Beware

LATHROP — Residents who do not have their downspouts disconnected and who have not been granted a permit to keep their downspouts connected, will be cited by police for being in violation of the city's downspout ordinance, council warned Monday.

Lists of violators already prepared by city officials, will be turned over to the police for action within the next few days, it was announced.

Jerald Stone, who handles downspout appeals, said there were well over 100 residents who have kept their downspouts connected illegally.

Councilman Richard N. Cogger asked for strict enforcement of the ordinance, stating it was unfair to those who already had conformed to the law.

Court Turns Down Rezoning Request

BLOOMFIELD — An attempt to build a commercial development on the east side of Woodward north of Square Lake road was rejected by Oakland County Circuit Judge Frank L. Doty this week.

Doty ruled in favor of Bloomfield township which had fought a move by Dr. Milford Golden, of Detroit to build a motel in the East Bloomfield Highlands Estates subdivision, part of which faces Woodward avenue. Golden wanted a change in zoning from residential to commercial.

Problems Go Unsolved

LATHROP — Deed restrictions are throwing a roadblock in front of the movement toward city recreation program, Mayor Lantz L. Mackey said Monday night.

Since the deed restrictions do not allow use of recreation on lots in the Southfield-Rainbow area it would take every property owner in the city to approve use of the area for recreation. One property owner could block the change, Mackey said.

"If the people want a recreation area, they will have to buy it, but they can't do it on the present budget," said Mackey who suggested that it might be done by subscription.

FROM THE POND

FROM THE POND, according to Dr. Jokela, the drain forms stream which flows south following Inkster, then paralleling Maple to a lagoon in the Braes No. 2 subdivision. From the lagoon, it crosses Maple in a culvert and flows to a marshy area at the north edge of Meadow Lake. From this point it moves south to Franklin Lake, the northeast and southeast corners of the entire distance Dr. Jokela states.

Two separate samples of water, two from the pond, have been tested. A sample taken by Dr. Jokela to the Oakland county health department lab April 4 was reported, the Braes No. 3 board members state, to be highly contaminated with the bacteria, named E. Coli, that could easily cause typhoid or related illness, including dysentery.

A sample taken by Alfred Zweig, representative of the Franklin Woods, was sent to Highland Park hospital for testing and was also reported to be highly contaminated.

Don E. Dasher, a resident of Inveray in Braes No. 3, had a sample of the water from the pond tested after a prize Springer Spaniel of his became sick shortly after Dasher moved to the area last summer. The Braes resident, whose home is near the pond, said a veterinarian confirmed the high contamination and advised his dogs be vaccinated against typhoid.

According to the Braes board, the raw sewage apparently originates from several old homes, involving 12 to 15 families, in the community. The board reports the sewage follows a closed drain to Inkster road and then empties into the open pond.

The Braes representative reports he has received a "run-around" from county health and drain officials since the complaint was made. He said he was also refused a written report on the county's test of water from the pond.

UNABLE to get any satisfaction from county officials, Dr. Jokela said the Braes No. 3 association felt it was necessary for area subdivisions to band together.

The first meeting, at which representatives from Bloomfield Farms, Braes of Bloomfield No. 1 and No. 2, Lone Pine Heights, Meadow Lake and Franklin Woods as well as Braes No. 3 were present, was held last Wednesday at the Bloomfield township hall.

A SECOND MEETING has been scheduled for Wednesday, July 10, also at the township hall. Representatives from Lone Pine Hills and Walnut Lake Estates No. 1 and No. 2, asked to attend the first meeting but not present, will be invited to the second meeting next week.

Pym Bloomfield Farms at the first meeting was John Payne. Attending from Braes of Bloomfield were H. D. Peacock and R. T. Eddy. David Robertson and R. R. Goodwin represented Lone Pine Heights and Meadow Lake, while represented by Clyde Fulton. From Franklin Woods were Don Marsh, Zweig and J. W. Peterson.

The entire board of directors of Braes No. 3, which called the meeting, was present. President of the Braes No. 3 group is Ira Weaver. Mrs. Jokela is secretary of the association.

Ceramic pieces in the exhibition were entered from the entire country. Bruce's winning exhibit was a hand-sculptured torso.

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
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
