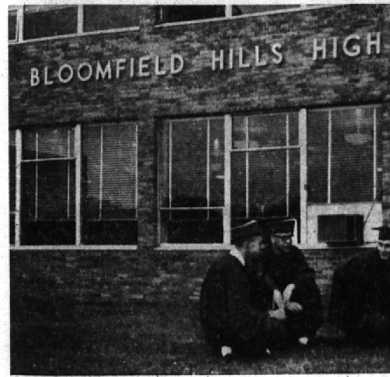

## This and That

Wonder how many Americans, on Memorial Day, reflected deeply on its meaning. There's little doubt but what to many it was just a day of rest from vocational enjoinment, to use for a variety of personal and family recreational pursuits. Some pondered its cause and prayed for true peacekeeping, and war's need to settle strife between nations. Yet beneath the topsoil and in the depths of earth's waters are the mortal remains of millions who, for the cause of mankind's freedom, fought and died for its preservation and perpetuity. Too bad more of us cannot realize Memorial Day's true meaning, and allow it to influence us more each and every day of every year.

It is believed in many presumed well informed circles in this nation that no real "emergency" exists in available school rooms for children of school age. Reports suggest that well organized segments of the population recruited from governmental bureaucracies and educational organizations are "whipping it up" to get federal aid for public schools. Instead, argue constitutionally minded people, "the States themselves ought to solve their own problems... not run to Uncle Sam for aid." Michigan, like many other States, would have to pay much, much more in taxes to Washington than would come back to it via the federal aid method.

Among the nation's 146 top labor unions, only 27 of their presidents receive over \$25,000 annual salary. Considering the basic responsibilities many of them bear, we don't believe many of them really are over-paid... especially those who maintain policies of decency, honesty, and the principles of free and secret ballot elections.

Humphrey, one of the country's most successful business men, has done an outstanding job in conducting a federal financial policy consistent with our wanted American free competitive enterprise system. There will be those who claim that he allowed interest rates on the national debt bonds to rise too high... they are those who approve increased wage rates for labor, and deny reasonable increasing profits for invested capital. Yet plenty of knowing voices will also rise in his defense of his courage in our economic system without undue bureaucratic interference; Humphrey, too, is a truly earnest defender of his country.

**B'ham C of C Plans Huge Fourth of July Pyrotechnic Display**  
Birmingham's Chamber of Commerce has announced plans for a Fourth of July fireworks display, a program viewed by more than 11,000 children and adults last year when it was held for the first time in more than 15 years.  
Tentative plans, according to Paul E. Kurth, fireworks committee chairman, are to double the size of last summer's display. The pyrotechnics will begin at 8 p.m., around 9 p.m., at Birmingham high school.  
Cost of this year's display will total about \$1,000, Kurth reported. The cost will be covered by contributions from both C of C members and civic-minded non-members, he stated.

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## Root Is Elected To B'ham B of E; Bond Issue OK'd

**Victory Margin Much Narrower**

Compared to four previous Birmingham school district bond issue votes, the fifth one Monday just squeaked but won by only 58 per cent of those voting approved \$6.8 million more for school construction.  
But there was no doubt whom voters wanted for the single 4-year vacancy on their board of education—Bennett Root.

He polled nearly twice as many votes as his nearest opponent, Malcolm Lovell.  
The candidates finished in this order:  
Root, 1,686; Lovell, 894; Harry T. Connor, 659; Donald R. Barton, 582; George J. Ferguson, 167; and Paul E. Sahlin, 154.

On the bond issue proposition, voters cast 2,830 affirmative ballots, 1,738 against.  
THE \$6.8 MILLION will be used to construct a new junior-senior high school, an elementary school, renovate Edgewood elementary school, and construct a service building to house buses and supplies.  
The current national tendency to tighten up the public purse strings was apparent here in Monday's balloting.  
Previous four voting majorities approached 80 per cent or higher.

**Hills Delays Decision To Expand Business Zone**  
Bloomfield Hills city commission delayed action until July 9 on a proposal to re-zone Barbour terrace property behind Kingsley Inn from multiple dwelling to commercial Tuesday night.  
The commission adjourned the public hearing on zoning which followed the monthly commission meeting after hearing protests from five citizens who attended the meeting. They contended that near-by property owners were concerned over the proposal but had become aware of it so recently that they were unable to attend the meeting.

**Hickory Grove OK's Annexation To Hills Schools**  
Merrill O. Bates, president, and Douglas L. Jocelyn, secretary, were re-elected to the Bloomfield Hills board of education Monday by 45 votes each. It was a token vote as they were elected without opposition.  
The district was enlarged in Monday's elections as Hickory Grove school district returned a vote 80 per cent in favor of annexation to Bloomfield Hills. A total of 375 votes for annexation and 69 against was cast in Hickory Grove.  
The annexation previously had been approved by Bloomfield Hills board of education and is expected to be completed by the end of June.

**To Receive Honorary Degree from U of M**  
Ernest R. Breech of Bloomfield township, board chairman of Ford Motor Co., will be one of five honored with honorary degrees Saturday at the 113th commencement of the University of Michigan.  
Breech will receive a doctor of laws degree. Scheduled to receive the same degree is Postmaster General Arthur R. Summerfield.
