

Re-Elect School Board Members; Millage Defeated

TROY—Incumbent School Board Member Lloyd A. Stage and Alex Tunstall had no trouble winning re-election Monday but they and other members of the board have to get along without \$119,850 they hoped voters would approve Monday.

The millage, turned down by 363 votes to 303, was earmarked for expanding teaching and custodial staffs.

Stage polled 466 votes, while Tunstall received 425. Sticker candidate Jack B. Muir gathered 163 votes.

Stuart K. Baker, school superintendent, said some cuts would have to be made but specific reductions would not be known for another week or so.

Challenges All Americans to Fight Inflation

James J. Nance, Ford Motor Company vice president - marketing, warned a St. Lawrence University graduating class Sunday that growing economic imbalance threatens an inflation that "could strike your generation as devastating a blow as depression struck mine."

He added that the solution to this threat is moral and political rather than economic, and that "the responsibility for meeting it rests upon all Americans, not just labor and management."

Nance, of Bloomfield Hills, was principal speaker at commencement exercises at which he received an honorary doctor of law degree.

NOTING THAT one of the characteristics of the nation's "new economy of abundance" is bigness—in business, in government and in labor—Nance asserted:

"One of the problems of this bigness is, of course, to maintain a reasonable balance of power among these forces, in the sense that neither business management, labor, nor administrative government shall unduly dominate the marketplace."

Nance told the graduates they are stepping into an age of which the outstanding single characteristic is material progress—"the only logical vehicle for creating the wealth and providing the basis for an international war on hunger, poverty, disease and ignorance."

HE SAID that while there is little doubt we should "pursue material progress as vigorously as we can," we must guard against loss or diminution of moral, spiritual and cultural values in the process.

"In this day when the soul of America is being tempted by the soft seductions of material plenty," he asserted, "we need those values far more urgently than in the days of adversity and bitter struggle."

"The great test of this generation will be its ability to live constructively in a society of unpassed plenty and material security."

Hesitate to Put Business B on Elm-Bowers Corner

How to let the prospective property owner use three lots at Bowers and Elm for storage of new cars, yet do it without making it available for unlimited retail use, stumped the Birmingham city commission this week.

They tabled until next Monday a rezoning hearing on the presently zoned single family parcels so Ford dealer Harold Turner can be asked if he will restrict the property to the use he proposes, or might even accept a new parking C zoning that would permit longer than 24-hour storage of cars.

BOTH NEIGHBORHOOD and city officials agree that single family right across the street from heavy retail use south of Bowers and west of Elm merits a zoning change.

But they hesitate to make it less restrictive than perhaps business C, which prohibits sale or storage of retail merchandise.

Parking Provisions Get Minor Changes

Several minor changes in Birmingham's off-street parking ordinance were approved this week by city commissioners.

Principal improvement was to require off-street parking facilities for all non-residential building.

Formerly, it applied only to commercial and industrial districts. The amendment now specifically prohibits any business from reducing existing parking facilities, if such reduction would cut the facilities below ordinance minimums.

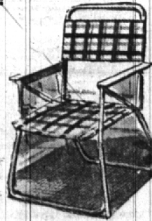

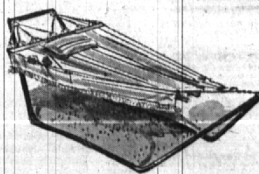

Youths Sentenced On Assault Charge

Sentences of five days in Oakland county jail, one year's probation, and \$100 costs were pronounced Monday against three youths charged in the February beating of 16-year-old Herbert Kannel, 1172 E. Ruffner, Birmingham.

Oakland County Circuit Judge George B. Hartwick handed down the sentences Monday in the cases of Clifford A. Soritor, 18, of 1223 Wattle, Birmingham; Mack Hartman, 21, of 77 Chopin, Troy; and Robert E. Fennest, 17, of 3984 Crooks road, Troy.

Originally charged with aggravated assault, the youths had pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of assault and battery.

Kannel was hospitalized with a broken leg after the assault on Woodward avenue in Birmingham.

Royal Oak to Take Last of Troy Twp.

TROY—Troy township will no more as soon as Royal Oak annexes the last 6-acre chunk of township territory.

This annexation will be complete when resolutions are filed with county clerk and secretary of state's office. Royal Oak and the former township board have already approved the move.

The property is owned by Mrs. Martha Tomidine of Redbank, N.J. and Mike Gruskiewicz, 4025 Crooks. The area was not annexed to City of Troy because it did not touch any of Troy's boundaries.
