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**Tri-T Chapter Marks Birthday**

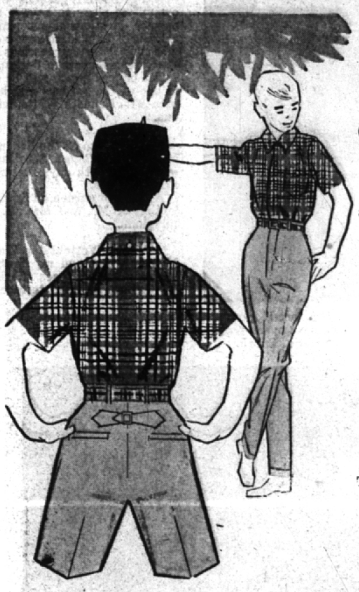

Birthdays, anniversaries, guests, births, parties are all news—call the society editor about them.



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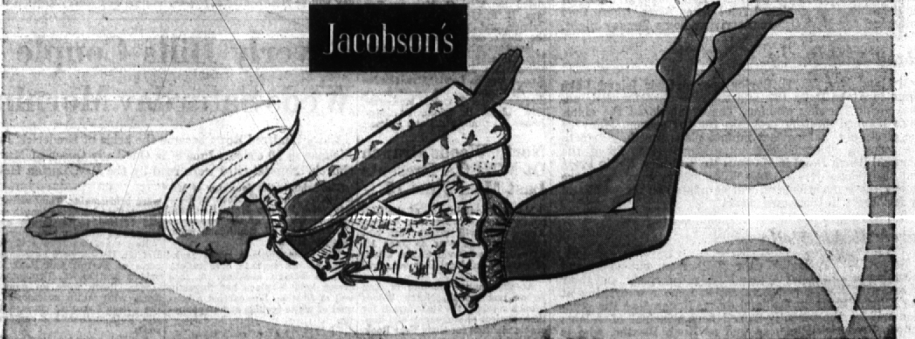
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
