Says Lake Huron Pipeline Feasible

A San Francisco engineering and construction firm last week said a plan to pipe Lake Huron water to serve Oakland and Macomb counties was feasible.

The word was received by Royal Oak Mayor Howard K. Kelley, chairman of the southeastern Michigan water authority which hired the firm, Sechtel Corp., to make the survey.

The company informed Kelley that an engineering and economics report will be required before plans for construction can be made and bonds sold to finance the project. The report will cost \$116,000 and will take three to four months for completion from the date of authorization. It was pointed out by the firm that other counties may want to join the project, although only two counties were considered in the preliminary investigation by the engineering firm.
