SHE'S YOUNG, we know, and a remarkable young woman. And according to Mrs. Wilma Hanson, secretary of the church, her help with the youth work is sorely needed.

"There's so much to be done," says Mrs. Hanson. "Mr. Searls enjoys working with the children, and it's hard for him to say 'no'."

Almost as if she were thinking aloud, she paid her boss a nice compliment.

"The children love him so," she said.

But they'll love their new assistant to the minister, too.

When a \$250,000 camp which he helped launch is dedicated Saturday, the Rev. Robert D. Dewey of the Congregational church of Birmingham will be there to see the completion of the important project. It was begun during the three years Mr. Dewey worked as minister to youth for the Ohio Congregational churches.

The camp is at the aptly titled location of Pilgrim Hills, near Columbus, and is called the Ohio Congregational conference camp.

A young man planning to enter the ministry will serve as student minister of Chester Congregational church near Grinnell, Iowa, next fall. He is former Birmingham resident Dave Allen, who was an active member of the senior high Pilgrim Fellowship at the Congregational church of Birmingham before entering Grinnell college, where he is now a sophomore.

Dave's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Allen, Jr., moved to Bergenfield, N. J. last July.

Dave made a name for himself as an athlete when he attended Birmingham high school. He still keeps in touch with his former minister, the Rev. Robert D. Dewey, and spent a week here with the Deweys this spring.

Dave plans to enter a seminary after he receives his BA at Grinnell.

Just back from the American Baptist convention in Philadelphia, the Rev. Dr. Emil Kuntz flew to Maine for a three-day visit Monday through Wednesday of this week. He was invited to give three talks at the state's United Baptist convention in Caribou, second most northern city in the state.

Sunday A. Stanley Rosso played his last chord at the organ of the Congregational church of Birmingham. He had directed the church's music program for three years.

A move to Lapeer, Michigan, where he has accepted a position with a bank, makes his resignation necessary.

In appreciation of the time and talent he gave, members of the church said a sincere "thank you" along with the "goodbyes" Sunday.

Groups Meeting To Plan Vacation Church School

"Do you really think they can worship right after coming in from recreation?" "This handbook project is all very well, but what's it get to do with our goal?"

Questions like these—and some answers to them—can be heard flying back and forth in groups meeting in homes and at the Congregational church in these days. They're planning the vacation church school that begins at the Congregational church the Monday after school's out, June 23, and runs through the third of July, for children from four years old through junior high.

PRE-REGISTRATIONS will be taken at the church the next two Sundays. There will be a 50¢ per child registration fee to help cover the cost of the school. Under the general superintendency of Mrs. Basil Sturman, trained supervisors, teachers and helpers will be in charge of each department, ready to help children learn in dozens of ways about the theme "The Church"—where it came from, what it stands for, and what it is doing. According to the Rev. Carl Baird, who hosts the title "Director" of the school, "The vacation church school will run from 9 to 11:30

each morning. That means twenty solid hours of Christian Education—more than we can get in a third of a year of Sunday church school—and without that week in between to forget it!"
