LATHRUP—After several months of negotiating, Lathrup and Buckeye Pipeline Co. have come to agreement on who would pay for re-paving Goldengate drive if Buckeye had to tear up the street to repair a gasoline pipeline below the surface.

A 20-foot right-of-way was given to Imperial Gas Co. in 1914 by the then-owners of the property where the pipeline now runs below Goldengate. Buckeye later bought out Imperial.

But Buckeye became concerned when Goldengate was paved and wanted assurance that their company would not have to repave should something go wrong with the gas line. That assurance is given in a contract drawn by City Attorney Everett F. Hayes and approved by council Monday.
