Will-O-Way Has Another Good Show: 'Desk Set'

Opening on Tuesday evening and running for a two-week stay at Will-O-Way Playhouse is William Marchant's light satire on automation and office parties, "The Desk Set". It looks like another good show for Director Bill Merrill and crew.

To judge from Tuesday evening's performance, it appears that the well-worn laughs of Will-O-Way's first summer comedy selection, "Mrs. McThing," will be eclipsed.

The play moved along well with superb timing and broadly comic acting coming from a cast of well-trained in the potentialities of the gentle satire of office manners.

"THE DESK SET" finds its charm in the good-natured spoofing of a group of unmarried research secretaries and their similarly unattached office supervisor, on the one hand, and an attractive—but unattracted—male executive on the other, who is introduced on the scene with the apparent twin purposes of unintentionally bringing about a union and—intentionally—getting a Union unit installed in the office in their place.

The Will-O-Way cast is headed in this show by Minnie Jo Curtis, a favorite of Birmingham theater audiences and a familiar figure on both local and national television shows.

It is certainly Miss Curtis' show—as it was designed to be.

To Push Work On New Hills Junior High

Rather than risk additional delays in its junior high school building program, Bloomfield Hills board of education voted Monday to let initial bids for work on the site at Quanton and Wing Lake roads even though the sewer situation has not been completely cleared.

Charles MacMahon of Smith, Tarapata and MacMahon, Inc., architects for the school, reported Bloomfield township has granted permission for the school to connect to the sewer interceptor at Telegraph and Maple roads if the district assumes "full responsibility" for the extension and legal fees involved.

JOHNSON reported that the district's school tax for next year will be 18.61 mills, with the Hickory Grove section being four mills higher. He said that Hickory Grove's annexation to the district had reduced original estimates slightly. Total assessed valuation for the enlarged district is \$61,014,197.
