Separate Storm Water, Sewage, Says Southfield

SOUTHFIELD—Spalding-Decker, engineers' request to connect house footing drains to sanitary sewers for Wedgewood and Roseland Woods subdivisions was turned down by township board last week.

Nelson Realty Co., developing the subdivisions, promised to purchase more flow into the Detroit sewage treatment system if they went beyond the 25 cfs (cubic feet per second) flow already authorized.

HOWEVER, Eugene S. Swem, township supervisor, pointed out that any cfs taken by roof or storm water would be deducted from the township's total cfs to Detroit and might deprive some other area from putting sanitary sewage into the Detroit system.

"Personally, if we allow it, we're going to be in trouble in purchasing more cfs and cfs is hard to buy," said Water Superintendent Leonard Lamb. "Sanitary is number one. Any storm water we can empty into a natural drain is just that much more sanitary sewage we'd have room for."

Public Hearings On Zone Changes Set for July 25

SOUTHFIELD—Zoning board will hold two public hearings on requests for change in zoning July 25, one from residential to parking classification and the other from residential to ERO-1.

At the same meeting, which will also serve as the board's August session and save the economy-minded township \$90, a public hearing date will be set on the WXYZ request for use of Dr. Harry Nelson's 90 acres at North-western and 10 Mile for television operations.

HERBERT W. Link, of Link Realty, Detroit, has requested that property east of the Mulkey building in Section 33 be changed from residential to vehicular parking to accommodate a drive-in department store which Link plans to lease.

Dale M. Hadsall, 20834 Greenview, president of Baseline Men's Club, requested that lots 4 through 18 in that subdivision along 8 Mile be changed to educational-research-office zoning.

Hadsall's group prefers this zoning to commercial which owners of the property have been seeking.

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Two-Car Troy Crash Hurts 4

TROY—Four persons were injured, two seriously, in a two-car collision Sunday morning at the Troy intersection of Livernois and Sixteen Mile road, Troy police report.

Three members of one family were taken to St. Joseph Mercy hospital in Pontiac. Denise Kujak, 3 years old, was admitted with a fractured left leg and lacerated forehead. Betty Louise Kujak, 25, her mother, was treated for contusions and abrasions of the body. Daniel Kujak, 1 1/2 years old, was treated for head contusions.

THE THREE were passengers in a car driven by Daniel Kujak, 27 years old, of 5601 Wright street, Troy. The driver of the second car, Myrtle Galdi, 37 years old, of 1454 Bannock, Troy, was released after treatment for a fractured collar bone.

Police said the car driven by Kujak was traveling south on Livernois and the second car, traveling east on Sixteen Mile road, stopped for the intersection and then pulled out in front of the Kujak car without waiting for traffic to clear.

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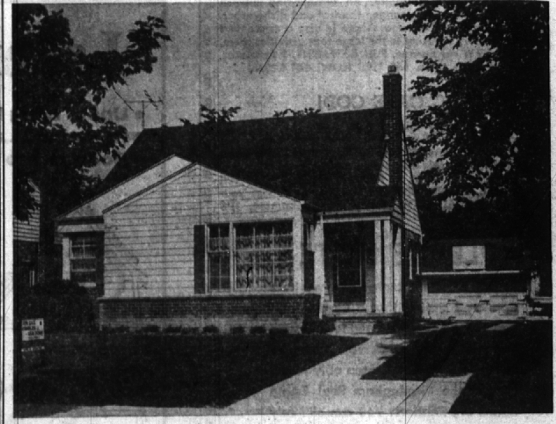
