

School's Out!— Watch Out!

"School's out—be alert for children everywhere!" recently cautioned Frank Baird-Smith, president of the Michigan Trucking association.

Baird-Smith said this warning is being issued by the Michigan Trucking association as part of the trucking industry's nationwide courtesy and safety campaign to control traffic accidents involving children during the summer holidays.

"Use caution approaching bicyclists. Cycling is a fine sport, but it has very definite dangers," MTA's president said.

"There is nothing between the bike rider and oblivion if anything goes wrong. Remember that the bike rider is faced with hazards that can spill him, yet which would go unnoticed by the automobile operator. Slow down for bike riders. Give them the widest possible berth when passing.

"Always watch for children playing in the streets. Make sure they see you and that they are safely out of your way before you pass," Baird-Smith concluded.

Survivors are her three sons, Alban B., Dwight V. of Brookfield, Ill. and Frank C. of Cocoa Beach, and 3 grandchildren.

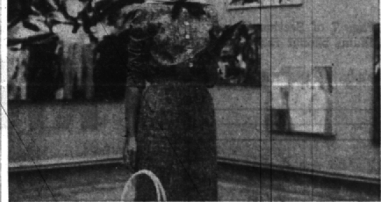
The body was sent to Tomahawk, Wis., for burial. Arrangements were by Bell chapel of W. R. Hamilton Co.
