

Three Arrested, Deputy Suspended As Franklin Road Oiling Fight Flares

FRANKLIN—This village's road oiling controversy blazed unabated this week following the arrest of three Franklin residents and the suspension of a member of the Franklin volunteer police department and the issuance of a summons to a Detroit firm, the actions resulting from the oiling of portions of seven Franklin roads in alleged violation of a village ordinance.

The arrests will result in the first court action in Franklin since its incorporation. The three Franklin residents and the Detroit firm have been ordered to appear before Justice A. C. Carr July 9.

Issued summonses were George Carterell, Homer Heideman and Calvin Brown and Bill's Road Oiling Co. of Detroit.

SUSPENDED temporarily from the Franklin police department was Deputy Harry Allen. Oil was spread in front of Allen's home although Allen did not sign the oil order and is not cited in the violation.

Franklin Village President Harold Roseberry stated he ordered Allen's suspension Saturday afternoon through Village Marshal Dick Ford.

Roseberry said the suspension was for negligence of duty. He said Allen took no action to stop the road oiling.

he noticed what they were doing on Wellington road. However, the pair checked with their office and were assured the signers had assumed full responsibility.—so the oiling continued.

The Saturday incident climaxed a long and bitter battle between some residents and the village council on the matter of road treatment and dust-jetting materials.

ORDINANCE NO. 6 requires property owners to apply for a permit to treat roads abutting their land. The council has been adamant in its stand against the use of oil and maintains that all Franklin roads are public domain and under the jurisdiction of the village council. Consequently, all work done on Franklin roads must be issued through the village office.

Justice Carr has asked for a change of venue so that court can be held at the Franklin Community hall at 8:30 p.m. July 9. Attorney William Hartman of Pontiac will represent the village.

There is no record of a court every having previously been held in Franklin. Other violations cases have appeared in Bloomfield or Southfield townships.

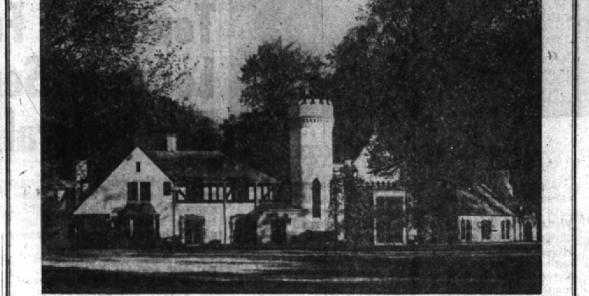

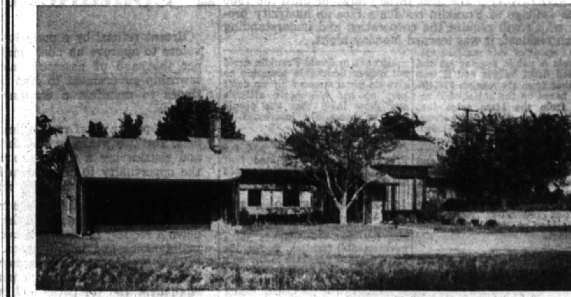
